



« FESTIVAL INTERGENERATIONS POUR UNE EUROPE DEMOCRATIQUE » Engaging Generations: Reflecting on a Vibrant EU Festival

Climate, with 41%, is right at the top of the five most important issues for young European voters, followed closely by civil rights including LGBTQI issues (34,5%), and social affairs including decent jobs (32%), in second and third on their list of concerns. International affairs rate fourth at 24% and public health at 20%. Other concerns rating under 12% include populism and democracy (12%), migration (8%) and rural development (8%).

These perceptions emerged during the one-day « FESTIVAL INTERGENERATIONS POUR UNE EUROPE DEMOCRATIQUE" organized in February at the Maison de l'Europe in Paris within the framework of a European-wide project involving youth in 15 countries, financed by the European Union and initiated and run by the European Youth Forum.

The driving spirit was to foster intergenerational dialogue and promote active citizenship, by building on the principles of the <u>MEET project</u> and in anticipation two major events:

- the upcoming EU Day of Solidarity between Generations on 28 April,
- the European elections on 9 June. The overriding message was –
 exercise your vote and remember voting is the first step.

OLD'UP's group Europe and the World, was in the driving seat and was happy to share the highlights of their intergenerational festival, that brought together diverse communities and perspectives during a vibrant celebration of unity and collaboration under one roof.
